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


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Early Years Wales Awards 2019

from Llandogo Early Years, Monmouthshire Early Years Wales Volunteer of the Year

This award was looking for a passionate and outstanding individual who goes above and beyond to donate their time to the early years sector.

Claire Drake Brockman (aka Miss Daisy) was our deserved winner of the Volunteer of the Year Award. She has been a huge part of Llandogo for many years, her work with the children – gardening, storytelling, arts and crafts etc was recognised by Estyn as having an Excellent impact on the children's well-being in the settings last inspection.

Rachel Davies tells us how it all began.

"Retiree, Miss Daisy has been a huge part of Llandogo for several years. She first approached us to ask if we'd like her help to teach the children about gardening & we jumped at her offer!

Miss Daisy visits us every week to teach the children about caring for the environment and gardening. As well as passing on her gardening skills to the children she also talks to them about where food comes from and gets them to try the fruit and vegetables we have grown together in our garden. The children always get take to home the produce they have helped grow.



The children are always making lovely things using plants, twigs and other natural resources that she provides.

One of the children's favourite activities is Hobby Horse Racing. Miss Daisy provides hobby horses for the children to pretend they are riding!

She also brings music, singing, creative storytelling and props. A staff member documents the learning and children add their voice to the book.

With the children she has also created 2 beautiful scarecrows for the garden.
